Programme title	Therapeutics Common Final Assessment in Independent Prescribing
Programme description	 The Therapeutics Common Final Assessment (TCFA) in Independent Prescribing is the final element of the route to registration in Independent Prescribing and delivered by the College of Optometrists. To undertake their TCFA, candidates must have passed the theoretical component of the route to registration and completed both a clinical placement and clinical logbook. There are three TCFA exam sittings in each calendar year (Spring, Summer & Autumn). The TCFAs are conducted virtually.

1.4 Purpose of the visit

Visit type TARGETED QUALITY ASSURANCE VISIT

The purpose of this targeted quality assurance visit was to review the College of Optometrists (the provider) Therapeutic Common Final Assessment (TCFA)(programme) to ensure it meets the requirements as listed in the GOC's Accreditation Handbook for Optometry Specialist Registration in Prescribing (2008) (handbook) and the GOC Education A&QA-Supplementary Document-List of Requirements (list of requirements).

The requirements being assessed were: IP1.10, IP2.3, IP4.1, IP4.4, IP4.8 & IP5.1.

This visit took place remotely.

1.5 Programme history		
Date	Event type	Overview
05/12/2019	Visit	A full approval quality assurance visit was carried out to consider the TCFAs. The provider was set two conditions and offered one recommendation. The panel recommended that the next visit should take place in November 2024.
27/05/2020	Change	The GOC noted a permanent change to run the TCFAs remotely.

26/04/2021	Change	The GOC noted that the provider would be permitting candidates to complete the clinical placement remotely/online.
21/07/2021	Change	The GOC noted that the provider would be allowing IP- qualified Ophthalmic practitioners to supervise clinical placements under the overall supervision of a designated Ophthalmologist member.
06/09/2021	Change	The GOC noted that the provider would be allowing IP candidates with more than two years between their completion of the theory element of the route to registration and their starting of the clinical placement. Candidates will have to have completed minimum CET/CPD to demonstrate continued relevant knowledge.
10/03/2023	Event	The GOC was informed of candidate concerns surrounding the delivery, content and conduct of the TCFAs conducted in March 2023.

3.1 Conditi	ons set at this visit
The unmet re	quirements for this visit are set out below along with the conditions that are

IP5.1	Providers must have quality assurance information/handbooks which indicate the QA arrangements to audit the appropriateness of the learning/assessment environments and provide guidance to achieve the requirements of this handbook.
Condition 1	The provider must submit evidence to demonstrate that they will be implementing a plan to improve their existing quality assurance oversight of the remote invigilation service provided by Test Reach.
Date due	Monday 15 January 2024
Rationale	During the visit, the panel heard that the provider was in conversation with their invigilation provider, Test Reach, to discuss the current quality assurance oversight of the service that Test Reach provide. It was highlighted that more robust quality assurance was required, and indeed the panel heard that the provider was currently exploring avenues to develop this, including receipt of invigilation recordings from Test Reach.
	The panel concluded that the provider needs to ensure that improvements like these are implemented into their quality assurance oversight of Test Reach, to meet this requirement. The panel requires that the provider submits evidence to demonstrate this.
Condition 2	The provider is required to develop mechanisms to gain regular feedback from examination candidates.
Date due	Wednesday 1 November 2023
Rationale	Whilst the panel recognised that candidates can submit feedback or raise concerns through emails and/or the appeals and complaints process, conversations during the visit highlighted that there were no alternative feedback mechanisms in place.
	The panel was of the view that a formal feedback mechanism should be separate from any appeals/complaints process. Therefore, the panel concluded that the provider needs to introduce a formal feedback mechanism to ensure effective monitoring of the TFCA process, and use of Test Reach, by those directly experiencing it. With the next set of TFCAs due to take place in November 2023, the panel requires that the provider submits evidence highlighting their plans to introduce these processes.

Rationale	Concerns highlighted by candidates in March 2023, investigated by the

	Given the time required to develop the systematic approach associated with
	Condition 3, the panel requests that the provider submits evidence to
	demonstrate that the questions included in the November 2023 TFCAs
	have been reviewed to ensure that such errors do not occur for these
	examinations. The panel expects a review process to become a regular
	element of the quality assurance process in future.
